Spartans Open Pro Football Season With Brooklyn Sunday

Shoe Town Outfit In Great Shape To Win Championship

Portsmouth, Ohio, Sept. 10.—Pro football in the National League will make its 1931 bow at Universal Stadium here Sunday afternoon, September 13. The Portsmouth Spartans under the tutelage of Coach George "Patsy" Clark and Brooklyn's Dodgers with Coach John E. Depler at the helm will lift off the lid for the season's opener.

To Match Brooklyn's headliner, "Stumpy" Thomason of Georgia Tech, Clark will trot out Mayes McClain, Haskell Indian and Iowa star who "Patsy" declares is the greatest Indian since Thorpe.

Depler will have Abbruzzino, Dowler and Yablik of Colgate; Scalzi of Georgetown, McBride, Syracuse, Hanson, Temple, Vance, Texas, in addition to Thomason as backfield fodder.

Spartan backs include Presnell, Nebraska, Tony Holm, Alabama; Lumpkin, Georgia Tech, Clark, Colorado; Schwartz, Washington State; Cykark, North Dakota; Stennett, California and Shelley, Texas.

Brooklyn opened its training season September 1 at Magnetic Springs the same day Clark called his purple herd of 25 ex-college stars together here at Universal Stadium. Both squads have been having two workouts a day with hard scrimmaging sprinkled in with the sprints and Jimmy work. Preliminary "conditioning" has been rapid, Clark and Depler each exchanging the courtesies of telling the other he is ready for whatever it takes to make up a win for the first game.

A Lineman himself, Depler is leaning hard on the support Mooney, Georgetown; Labrutovich, Wisconsin; Watkins, Georgia Tech and Haines, Colgate, can give him at tackle. He especially understands the tackle's importance and his viewpoint. At guards Depler can send in Gilson, Colgate; Fulton, Oglethorpe and Melzinger, Carnegie Tech. Butlman, Marquette and Jonas, Utah, will alternate at center.

On the wings Depler will have such stellar performers as Nemecek, N. Y. C.; Stramiello, Colgate; Tomaine, Georgetown and Wagner, Columbia.

The Spartan line stacks up favorably with Brooklyn. Clark has four great ends in Ebding, St. Marys; McKalip, Oregon; Peterson, Texas, and Long, Southern Methodist.

At the tackles he can count on Douck, W. & J.; Waters, Florida and Schleusner, Iowa. Emerson, Texas; Lee, Oklahoma; Bodenger, Tulane; Armstrong, Missouri and Roberts, Iowa, make strong combinations at the guard posts. Center position is well

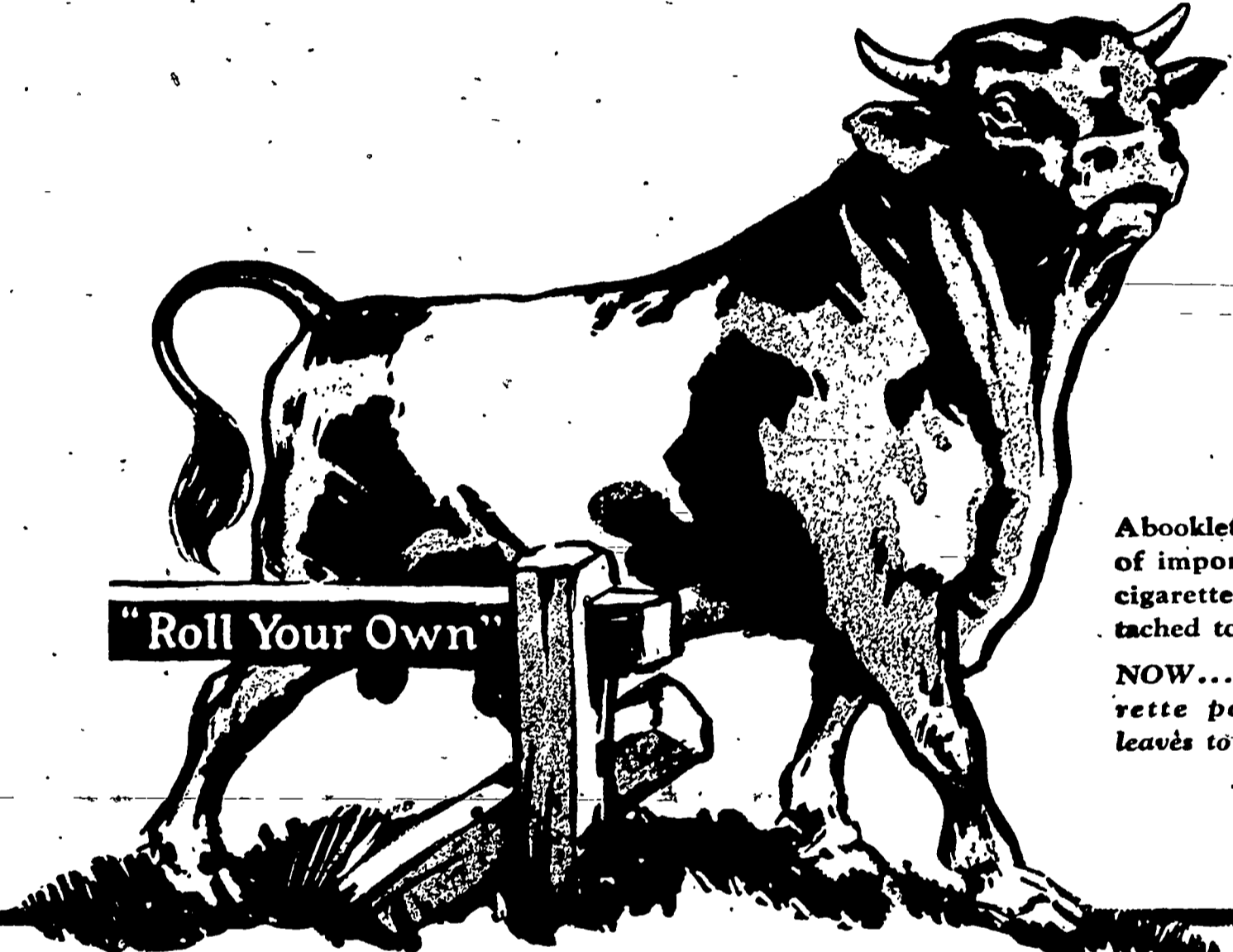
